1. The objects of OutStories Bristol are:

- a) To promote social inclusion for the public benefit of people in Bristol and neighbouring districts who identify as lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender by gathering and recording the experience of people who are socially and economically excluded on the grounds of their gender identity or sexual orientation
- b) To promote the needs of such people and supporting their participation in society through the publication of their common history
- c) In furtherance of these objects, the trustees shall:
 - I. Increase, co-ordinate and provide information about opportunities for LGBT people in Bristol and neighbouring districts to record their individual and collective stories
 - II. Give LGBT people a voice and facilitate their engagement with relevant agencies that record the history of the City, in order to influence the quality and relevance of local services and provisions and so better meet the needs of LGBT people
 - III. Research or participate in research into the causes and effects of social exclusion of LGBT people in Bristol and neighbouring districts
 - IV. Promote activities that support the health and well-being of LGBT people in Bristol through the collection and publication of shared history

2. Membership of the Association

Membership of OutStories Bristol is open to anyone who is interested in furthering its purposes, and who, by applying for membership, has indicated his, her or its agreement to become a member and acceptance of the duty of members set out in sub-clause iii of this clause. 4. Activities in the period October 2020 to September 2021

The Covid-19 pandemic prevented in-person activities throughout the year, both events and gathering oral history. Nevertheless Cheryl Morgan gave many online talks on our behalf.

Events

AGM 2020 and 7th John Addington Symonds Annual Lecture, 10/10/2020. Due to the Covid pandemic this was an online event. Our thanks to Dr Alan Greaves, Senior Lecturer in the Department of Archaeology, Classics and Egyptology at the University of Liverpool, who gave a talk on the long history of statue desecration.

Robert Howes gave a Virtual LGBTQ History Tour of Bath 25/2/2021 as part of LGBT History Month; hosted by Bath and North East Somerset Council. He led a Bath LGBTQ History Walk 12/9/2021 as part of the Bathscape Walking Festival.

Website and social media

The OutStories Bristol website averages 600 visitors/month. It has seen an increase in the quantity of new articles, notably experiences of the Covid pandemic to 'My Queer Quarantine'. Preparatory work has begun on a redesign of the website.

For technical reasons the Android version of the *Mapping LGBT+ Bristol* app has been withdrawn. The iOS (iTunes) version is still available from the Apple App store and the map can still be viewed on our website and Bristol City Council's *Know Your Place* website.

@OutStoriesBris has 900+ followers on Twitter and a steady stream of tweets.

Revealing Stories exhibition

Since their creation in 2013 the 'Revealing Stories' display panels have been exhibited for a total of 502 days in 23 different locations, far beyond our original expectations. We have decided to retire the physical display panels and plan to replace them with an updated digital version.

Oral history

To date we have recorded the stories of 63 people. All recordings have been deposited with Bristol's M Shed museum as part of the city's archives; most are available to researchers.

Further oral history interviewing has been suspended due to the Covid pandemic and resultant restrictions on face-to-face contact.

5. Financial report

Our financial year runs 1st July to 30th June.

Total income for the year was £1633 and comprised:

- A £757 donation from the residual funds of LGBT Bristol on its closure.
- Donations from five individuals named in Section 6 below.

No grants were received during the year.

Total expenditure was £491 comprising:

- £133 public liability insurance
- £226 fees associated with our website and cloud storage
- £60 publicity and promotion
- £72 bank charges.

Therefore the surplus was £1142. Cash in bank at 30/6/2021: £2715.

Spending was low because OutStories was not involved in any major projects during the year.

Due to the Covid pandemic there was no spend from the £250 Bristol LTBTQ+ Voice & Influence Partnership grant received in 2019-2020.
